University of Vermont Project ECHO Cancer Survivorship for Primary Care

The Cancer Survivorship series will discuss best practices and evidence-based care for cancer survivors, including support of psychosocial and wellbeing needs, implementation of appropriate preventive measures, and management of the late effects of cancer treatment. The program is a collaborative effort developed with the Vermont Department of Health, the UVM Cancer Center, Vermonters Taking Action Against Cancer (VTAAC), and an interprofessional team with a statewide focus. Vermont data, regional and state resources, and models of care will be discussed. With added awareness, primary care providers and their teams, including those in more rural settings, will be able to collaborate and coordinate care more effectively for cancer survivors.

AFTER THIS SERIES, PARTICIPANTS WILL BE ABLE TO:

- 1. Describe the medical and psychosocial issues cancer survivors may face and strategies to address common challenges.
- 2. Identify the range of resources and support available to cancer survivors, with a focus on rural settings.
- 3. Apply current evidence to improve care provided for cancer survivors.
- 4. Develop care plans, including coordination strategies to deliver patient-centered care for cancer survivors.
- 5. Connect with the network of statewide expertise that is available to support medical providers and their patients in the care of cancer survivors.

This series is offered at no-cost to participants through a grant from the Vermont Department of Health. Participants can receive CME for each session attended.


UVM Project ECHO offers several cohort-based series each year. The target audience often includes individuals or teams from primary care offices throughout the state.
